MEETING PEOPLE

- There is also an opportunity to talk about how people greet each other (for example, by shaking hands or bowing).





DIFFERENT COUNTRIES-DIFFERENT GREETINGS

1. Read the text about different greetings

Different countries and different cultures have different greetings. Learning about how people greet each other can help you to avoid some embarrassing moments.

Arab countries:

It's a common practice in the Middle Eastern countries to greet each other with a handshake. Men may follow this with kissing cheeks.


France:

When you meet someone, you have three options: you can shake hands with a stranger, kiss friends or family or simply say 'bonjour.'

UK:

On meeting someone for the first time, British generally shake hands if it's a formal situation, or even just smile at each other.





DIFFERENT COUNTRIES-DIFFERENT GREETINGS

USA:

In the USA, greetings are quite casual – a handshake, a smile, and a hello will do just fine. In this country, it is unusual for men to kiss when they greet each other.

Japan:

In Japan, the common way to greet someone is to bow down.

Russia:

a firm handshake is the standard way for men to greet one another in public.

India:




